A Well-Deserved Retirement

Mr. Elwin Rose has served as a Wattsburg Area School District Board member for more than 40 years, and has worked with a total of 50 plus board members during his tenure. During his time on the school board, Mr. Rose enjoyed serving as president for 28 years. The Seneca High School newspaper, the Bobcat Pride, recently had the pleasure to speak with him about his wealth of experiences.

Mr. Rose believes that closing the different elementary schools in Wattsburg and building new schools on the same campus was the most influential decision that he and other board members had to make during his tenure. At that time, many people in the district were hesitant toward the new schools, and did not want to close the old schools, but once the new buildings were constructed, the community embraced the decision. It all worked out for the best because our buildings are beautiful, clean, and give a sense of pride to the people affiliated with our district. In the future, Mr. Rose foresees that the bus garage may be renovated because the existing garage has not been updated for a long time. He believes that the WASD campus is now complete with all schools and administrative buildings in a central location.

In the field of education, some things never change. Mr. Rose assured us that there were several recurring items on the board agenda, including student disciplinary issues and financial issues. Fortunately, he explained, we do not have many disciplinary hearings and many people outside the community have commented to Mr. Rose that our students have good reputations.

Mr. Rose particularly enjoyed attending the baccalaureate ceremonies preceding the Seneca High School graduations. He was present at 39 of these ceremonies during

his tenure with the Wattsburg Area School District. Over the course of 40 high school graduations, Mr. Rose had the honor of awarding diplomas to approximately 4,156 graduates. Due to the fact that Mr. Rose was a central figure in 40 Seneca graduations, the school board recently surprised him by naming the Seneca High School auditorium in his honor.

When Mr. Rose makes his departure to retirement, he says that he will miss the people that he worked with and the lifelong friends he made while working on the school board. He plans to visit his three daughters and spend time with his eight grandchildren. Mr. Rose was married

Local School Directors Honored

Long-term school directors were honored by the Pennsylvania School Boards Association at the statewide educational conference held in Hershey. Nearly 900 board members, ranging in service from 8 to 48 years, were recognized on October 14th.

Elwin Rose, a member of the Wattsburg Area School District school board, received recognition for 40 years of service. He was presented with a plaque adding him to the PSBA "Honor Roll of School Board Service." Jim Thompson was unable to attend the conference, but was provided with a Certificate of Appreciation for 8 years of service on the WASD school board.

"Mr. Rose is an exceptionally dedicated individual who has devoted much of his time and energy to making the school district the best it can be for all students," stated

Nancy Sadaly, Superintendent. "This district has been fortunate to have had Mr. Rose both as school board president and an active member of the board during his tenure. Mr. Rose is well-respected in the community and has done an exceptional job of serving the public interest for 40 years. Mr. Thompson has also faithfully given of his time for the betterment of the district for eight years. Both his calm demeanor and common sense approach have been helpful in moving discussion forward and resolving conflicts."

PSBA President Frederick E. Botterbusch II, Dallastown Area School District school director, spoke about the recipients and their years of dedicated volunteer service to children, the community, and public education. "School directors continually are spending more of their personal time on school-related activities," he said. "Sixty-five percent of them devote 16 hours or more a month to school board business. That shows real commitment on their part."

According to Botterbusch, these individuals put in, on the average, about two-and-a-half working days per month of non-paid, volunteer service as school directors. "They exemplify leadership and dedication, giving unselfishly to their communities, students, and the public schools," he said. "Their efforts, along with those of fellow board members, reflect their dedication to giving our children the opportunity to gain knowledge through the best educational system possible."

The Seneca High School Science Department and students received a certificate of achievement recognizing their outstanding performance on the 2009 PSSA Science Exam. The Keystone Teachers Association in conjunction with the Pennsylvania Department of Education and professional statisticians from Penn State University determined Seneca High School scored in the top 10% of the state on the Pennsylvania State Science Assessment. Through hard work and dedication of the science staff and students, Seneca High School ranked 48th in the state, of the Commonwealth's 501 school districts, placing them in the 90.6 percentile among public school districts.

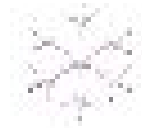
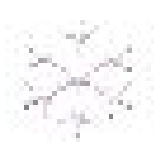

CSI: Wattsburg

Have you ever wanted to be a detective? The 6th grade students did just that when they spent a week as crime scene investigators. To develop background knowledge, they read and analyzed several nonfiction selections about the origin of criminal identification systems including the Bertillon System, CODIS (Combined DNA Information System) and AFIS (Automated Fingerprint identification System). As part of the CSI unit, two forensic anthropologists from Mercyhurst College visited the boys and girls and explained how human remains are used to help identify victims of crimes. The students also rotated through seven "evidence stations" and, working in small teams, gathered data to determine the identity of a fictitious murder suspect.

WAMS Red Ribbon Week 2009

Red Ribbon Week provides an opportunity to promote anti-drug messages. This celebration originated in Calexico, California; the hometown of Special Agent Enrique Camarena, a Special Agent with the D.E.A. who was killed in the line of duty. This is the 21st year of this nationwide event.

W.A.M.S. celebrated Red Ribbon Week 2009 with several student activities. Our campaign centered on the theme to *Elect to Be Drug Free*. The initial kickoff to the week provided an explanation to students as to the origin of Red Ribbon Week. Students were encouraged to dress in support of various themes throughout the week (i.e. wearing red, white, and blue in representation of electing to be drug free, favorite sports shirts to represent teaming up against drugs). WAMSAG provided Red Ribbon Week pencils which were distributed to each student in homeroom.

ATTENTION PARENTS/ GUARDIANS

DON'T WAIT VACCINATE NOW!

FOR ATTENDANCE IN ALL GRADES IN 2010/2011, children need the following vaccinations:

- 4 doses of tetanus* (1 dose on or after the 4th birthday)
- 4 doses of diphtheria* (1 dose on or after the 4th birthday)
- 3 doses of polio
- 2 doses of measles **
- 2 doses of mumps**
- 1 dose of rubella (German measles)**
- 3 doses of hepatitis B
- 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine or history of disease

*Usually given as DTP or DTaP or DT or Td

** Usually given as MMR

Children ATTENDING 7th grade in 2010/2011 need the following:

- 1 dose of tetanus, diphtheria, acellular pertussis (Tdap) (if 5 years has elapsed since last tetanus immunization)
- 1 dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (MCV)

These requirements allow for medical reasons and religious beliefs.

If your child is exempt from immunizations, he/she may be removed from school during an outbreak.

Pennsylvania's school immunization requirements can be found in 28 PA. CODE CH. 23 (School Immunization)
